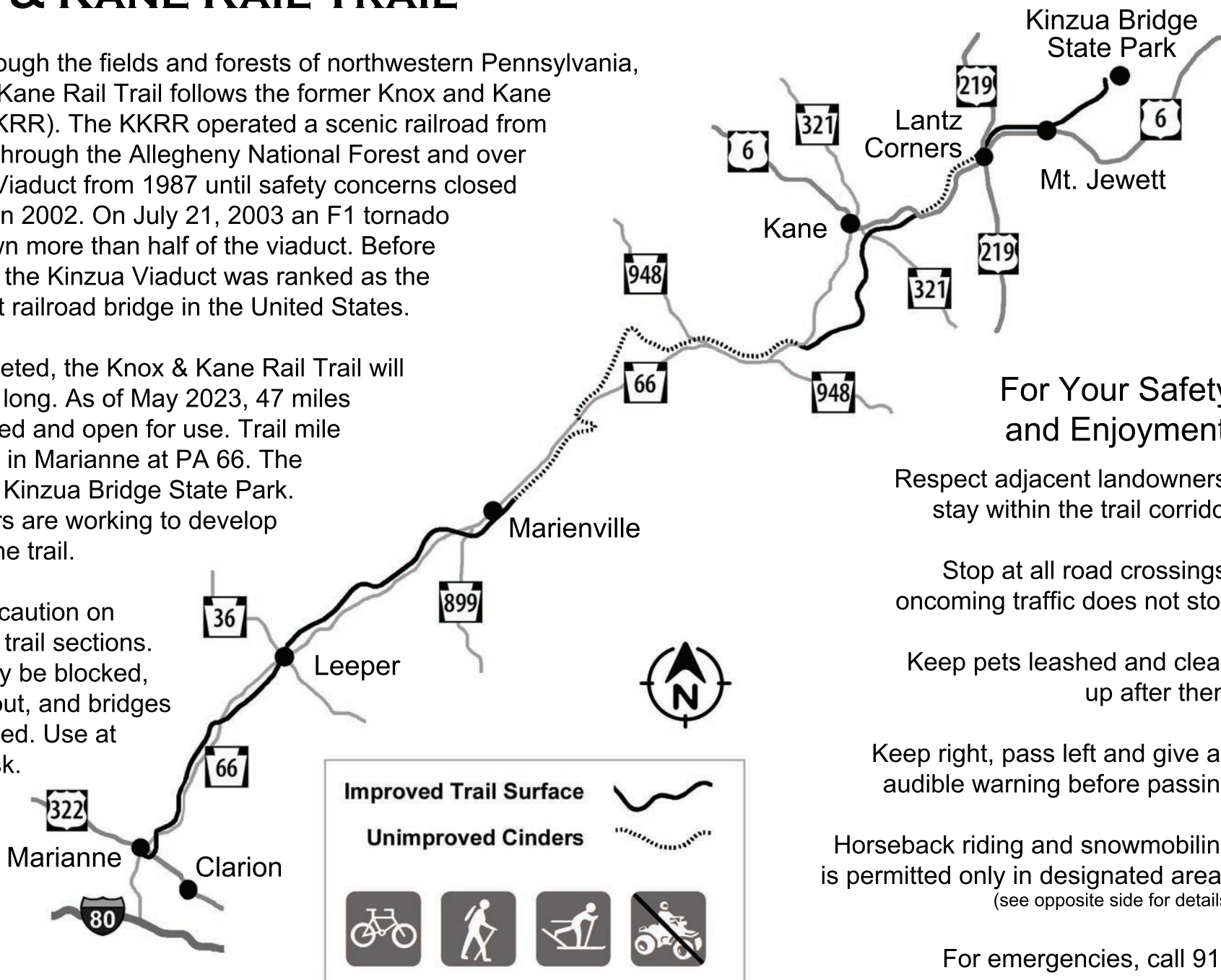


KNOX & KANE RAIL TRAIL

Winding through the fields and forests of northwestern Pennsylvania, the Knox & Kane Rail Trail follows the former Knox and Kane Railroad (KKRR). The KKRR operated a scenic railroad from Marienville through the Allegheny National Forest and over the Kinzua Viaduct from 1987 until safety concerns closed the viaduct in 2002. On July 21, 2003 an F1 tornado brought down more than half of the viaduct. Before its collapse, the Kinzua Viaduct was ranked as the fourth-tallest railroad bridge in the United States.

Once completed, the Knox & Kane Rail Trail will be 74-miles long. As of May 2023, 47 miles are developed and open for use. Trail mile "zero" starts in Marianne at PA 66. The trail ends at Kinzua Bridge State Park. Trail partners are working to develop the rest of the trail.

Please use caution on unimproved trail sections. The trail may be blocked, or washed out, and bridges may be closed. Use at your own risk.



For Your Safety and Enjoyment

Respect adjacent landowners, stay within the trail corridor

Stop at all road crossings, oncoming traffic does not stop

Keep pets leashed and clean up after them

Keep right, pass left and give an audible warning before passing

Horseback riding and snowmobiling is permitted only in designated areas

KNOX & KANE RAIL TRAIL



As of May 2023, 47 miles of the 74-mile rail trail are developed and open for use. Trail advocates are working to develop the rest of the trail. Here's what is open for you to explore now:

Marianne to Marienville - 27 miles

This section of the trail is paved.

Stop in the communities of Marianne and Leeper for food, ice cream, and restaurants. For detailed information: Rail 66 Country Trail: rail-66.com

Stop in Marienville for food, ice cream, restaurants, lodging, and a WiFi hotspot at the library, adjacent to the trail. Snowmobiles are permitted on the trail from Marienville to Goat Farm Road (FR 226). Jenks Township manages this section of the trail.

Parking areas:

- Marianne Trailhead: US 322 at Willow Lane (41.2372, -79.4175) (bike repair station)
- Lucinda Station and Parking: at PA 66 follow Maple Drive north (41.3142, -79.3694) (bike repair station)
- Snydersburg Parking: Lutz Drive near PA 66 (41.3314, -79.3549)
- Farmington Twp Park: at PA 66 in Leeper follow PA 36 north (41.3733, -79.3076) (bike repair station)
- North Country Trailhead: Kahle Drive at PA 66 (41.4193, -79.2107)
- Marienville Hub: South Forest Street (41.4682, -79.1232)

Nansen to Kane Country Club – 12.3 miles

This section of trail is surfaced with compacted gravel.

Kane is a full-service community with food, ice cream, restaurants, locally made beer, wine and spirits, lodging, and a hospital. For detailed information: Trail Association of the Elk/McKean Divide: tamedkkrt.org

Parking areas:

- Lamont Parking: Highland Road at National Fuel Gas Pump Station (41.6115, -78.8062)
- Kane Borough Trailhead: US 6 across from Welsh Street in Kane (41.6593, -78.8044)

Lantz Corners to Kinzua Bridge State Park – 7.8 miles

This section of trail is surfaced with compacted gravel.

Horseback riding and snowmobiling are permitted on this section of the trail (however, horses and snowmobiles cannot enter from Kinzua Bridge State Park). For detailed information: Mt. Stop in the communities of Lantz Corners and Mt. Jewett for food, ice cream, restaurants and lodging.

Do not park along US 219 to access the trail - there is no legal parking and traffic is very heavy.

Parking areas:

- Hacker Street Parking: at US 6 follow Kushequa Avenue to Hacker Street in Mt. Jewett (41.7243, -78.6466)
- Center Street Trailhead: at US 6 follow Center Street to Peterson Street in Mt. Jewett (41.7263, -78.6409) (bike repair station)
- Kinzua Bridge State Park: Can be crowded on warm weather weekends and fall color season. We recommend parking in Mt. Jewett and biking to the park.
